2008 Primary Election: Vote!

The primary election on February 5th is fast approaching. Primary ballots will be available for the Republican, Democrat, and Green parties. When Illinois voters enter their polling place in primary elections, they may choose to vote the ballot of any one party. They are then listed on Election Commission rolls with that party's affiliation until the next primary election, unless they petition for a change of affiliation.

There are two referenda propositions on the ballot:

- **DuPage County sales tax** proposal for public safety tax of \$0.25 per \$100.
- **School District 203 bond issue** for \$43M to build and equip additions and alter, repair, and equip various schools.

Besides the well-publicized presidential party nominees, hot local races include Republican contests for:

- **IL 48th Representative District** (Michael G. Connelly, Douglas P. "Doug" Krause, Dave Carlin)
 - **County Board District 2** (vote for 2) (Brien Sheahan*, Patrick J. O'Shea*, Laura Fitzpatrick, Anna Marie Manzo)
 - **County Board District 5** (vote for 2) (Joseph Martin "Joe" Wozniak, Gerald A. "Gerry" Cassioppi, James D. Healy*)

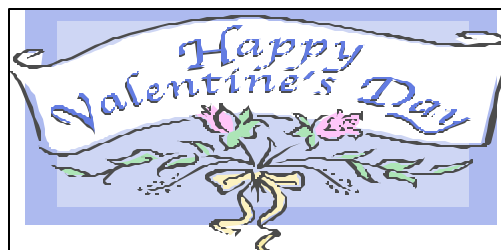
This month’s tip!

Assessments are paid annually. The billing for the new year's assessment will be mailed out no later than Nov. 29th. Payment is due Jan. 1 st. If payment is not received by Feb. 1 st, an administrative fee is added to the assessment. If an owner does not receive an invoice by Dec. 10th, notify management immediately. GTIA policy states the homeowner is responsible for paying on time, with or without the invoice. SELLING? REFINANCING?

Board members excused: Joan Dudas, Linda Gilbert, Terri Kolman, Gail Robinson. Management: Joanne Broda. Paula Gleason was Recording Secretary. A quorum was present.

Open Forum: None

Minutes of the Prior Meeting: Minutes of the prior meeting were reviewed. It was noted that the date on page 2 under Management Report referencing replaced pines should be Nov '06 not Nov 6^h.

Board Motion: Marg Hough moved to approve the minutes of the December meeting as amended, Julie LaFond seconded. The motion was passed by unanimous voice vote.

Treasurer's Report: John Charicki reviewed the December Balance Sheet and Income and Expense Statement.

Management recommends an investment of \$150,000 in a six-month CD at Lisle Savings Bank bearing 4.7% interest.

Board Motion: Rodd Elges motioned to accept the revised check register expenditures of \$6,349.58 for January, Marg Hough seconded. Motion was passed by unanimous voice vote.

Board Motion: Betty Long motioned that management invest \$150,000 in a six-month CD at Lisle Savings Bank bearing 4.7% interest, John Charicki seconded. The motion was passed by unanimous voice vote.

Management Report: Telephone log line items were reviewed.

Management noted that two more units were sold in the College Green apartment-condo conversion.

Management reported that there were no new sales in December in the Torrey Pines conversion.

Management stated that \$245,000 in 2008 assessments have been collected to date.

Management submitted copies of a new roster and committee sheet for review. Revised sheets will be provided next month with contact information changes and revisions to committees.

Management reminded Board members to be prepared to take a Board photo at the next meeting. Management provided a list of December 2007 newcomers. Board Directors are encouraged to call on newcomers in their respective areas.

It's Valentine's Day, so here's your chocolate dessert. Not everyone will have a Valentine come February 14th. No Matter. Whether you find yourself with or without a Valentine, it will be love at first bite!

Chocolate-Glazed Hazelnut Mousse Cake (6 - 8 Servings)

Looks involved, but simple to prepare. Cake, without glaze, can be made ahead and chilled up to 2 days; cake can be glazed 6 hours ahead and chilled, uncovered, doesn't require any last-minute fussing.

For Shortbread Base:

- | | |
|-----------------------|--|
| 2 T toasted hazelnuts | ¼ C unsalted butter, softened |
| 3 T sugar | 2 T unsweetened Dutch-process cocoa powder |
| ½ C all-purpose flour | 1/8 tsp salt |

Put oven rack in middle position, preheat oven to 350 degrees. Invert bottom of 8" springform pan (to make it easier to slide base off bottom), then lock on side of pan and line bottom with parchment paper. Pulse nuts and sugar in food processor till nuts are chopped; add flour, butter, cocoa and salt; pulse till dough forms. Press dough evenly onto bottom of springform pan. Prick all over with a fork, bake till dry to the touch, 18-20 minutes. Transfer base to a rack to cool approx 30 minutes. Remove side of pan and carefully slide out parchment from under shortbread, then reattach side of pan around shortbread base.

While shortbread cools, make *Mousse*:

| 1 tsp unflavored gelatin | 1-1/2 C chilled heavy cream |
| 3 T cold water | 1 T unsweetened Dutch-process cocoa powder |
| ½ C chocolate hazelnut spread (Nutella) | 3 T sugar |
| ½ C mascarpone (1/4 lb) | |

Sprinkle gelatin over water in heavy saucepan, let stand till softened, about 5 minutes. Heat gelatin mixture over low heat, stirring till gelatin is melted. Whisk in chocolate hazelnut spread till combined and remove from heat. In a large bowl, whisk together mascarpone and chocolate hazelnut mixture. In another large bowl, beat together cream, cocoa powder and sugar with mixer at low speed until just combined, then increase speed to high and beat until cream just holds soft peaks. Whisk 1/3 of whipped cream into mascarpone mixture to lighten, then fold in remaining whipped cream until well combined. Spoon filling onto shortbread base in pan, gently smooth top, chill, covered, at least 3 hours.

For Ganache:

- ¼ C + 1 T heavy cream
- 3-1/2 oz fine-quality bittersweet chocolate (not unsweetened), chopped

Bring cream to a simmer in small heavy saucepan, remove from heat. Add chocolate, let stand 1 minute, then gently whisk till completely melted and smooth. Transfer ganache to small bowl, cool, stirring occasionally, till slightly thickened, but still pourable, about 20 minutes.

Remove side from springform pan, slide cake off bottom of pan onto serving plate. Pour ganache onto top of cake and spread, allowing excess ganache to drip down sides. Voila!

Heart Healthy IQ

Give a loved one the gift of life. The following statements represent a heart-healthy lifestyle that can reduce your chances of cardiovascular disease. Check each statement that reflects your lifestyle.



- I do not smoke and I try to avoid inhaling the smoke of others.
- I eat a balanced diet that limits my intake of saturated fat and cholesterol.
- I participate in continuous, vigorous physical activity for 20-30 minutes at least three times a week.
- I have my blood pressure checked regularly.
- I maintain an appropriate weight.
- I know my family history of heart disease.

If you checked most of these statements you are doing great! Keep up the good work! If you checked only a few you should make an attempt to improve your lifestyle right away.

Cardiovascular disease is one of the most common causes of death for all ages. Would you know what to do if a loved one or co-worker were to suffer a heart attack? Learning how and being prepared to use CPR is an excellent beginning. However, CPR is only one of the

links in what is known as the *Cardiac Chain of Survival*. The links in the cardiac chain of survival include:

- **Early Recognition and Early Access.** The sooner 9-1-1 or your local emergency number is called, the sooner early advanced life support arrives.
- **Early CPR.** Early CPR helps circulate blood that contains oxygen to the vital organs until an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) is ready for use or advanced medical personnel arrive.
- **Early Defibrillation.** Most victims of sudden cardiac arrest need an electric shock called defibrillation to restore the heart to a regular rhythm. Each minute that defibrillation is delayed reduces the victim's chance of survival by about 10 percent.
- **Early Advanced Life Support.** This is given by trained medical personnel who provide further care and transport to hospital facilities.

Almost a third of the deaths from sudden cardiac arrest could have been prevented if an AED had been available for immediate use at the time of the emergency. For more information, visit the American Red Cross at www.redcross.org.

It might sound too good to be true, but it is: In moderate amounts, chocolate can actually be healthy for you. Dark chocolate, in particular, is rich in antioxidants called flavonoids that have been shown to assist in the prevention of heart disease and cancer.

According to Deena, owner of Curves of Lisle, antioxidants found in fruits and vegetables are one of our best defenses.

To increase the amount of disease-fighting antioxidants in your diet, make sure you eat at least five servings of fruits and vegetables every day. Vegetables with the most color tend to have the most antioxidant potential.

“You may not realize it, but most natural foods- including coffee, nuts, cinnamon, legumes, wine, whole grains and even potatoes- all contain antioxidants,” Watson said. “Remember, moderation is key to diet and health, so, make these whole foods the center of your diet and let chocolate be your guiltless pick-me-up.”

Dark chocolate, specifically, may help lower your blood pressure and improve your mood. So, this Valentine's Day, consider making something that is delicious and healthy for your sweetie.

This recipe has a double dose of antioxidants because it has both strawberries and chocolate - a yummy combination.

Dark Chocolate Dipped Strawberries

3 oz dark chocolate
8 strawberries

Melt chocolate by using a double boiler or microwave. Then, dip washed and dried strawberries in the chocolate mixture and allow them to cool on a baking sheet lined with parchment paper for about 30 minutes. Enjoy!
Makes 4 servings. Per serving: 126 calories, 7 g fat, 16 g carbohydrate, 2 g protein.

Lisle safe from holiday decorations fires



Once again, the Lisle-Woodridge Fire Protection District, though education of its citizenry was able to “Keep the Wreath Red” over this past holiday season.

The “Keep the Wreath Red” program was originated by the Lisle-Woodridge Fire Protection District's Chief Emeritus Paul Boecker as a means to remind our residents of the importance of fire safety and prevention, particularly during the holiday season. The program is now used statewide.

Each year wreaths bearing red light bulbs are placed on each station in Fire

District. If there is a fire caused by holiday decorations or the like, a red bulb is replaced with a white one.

Since the program started, there has never been a white bulb replacing a red one on the wreaths in the Lisle-Woodridge Fire Protection District.
